

In 2016, 23% of persons age 65 and over were members of racial or ethnic minority populations—9% were African Americans (not Hispanic), 4% were Asian or Pacific Islander (not Hispanic), 0.5% were Native American (not Hispanic), 0.1% were Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander (not Hispanic), and 0.7% of persons 65+ identified themselves as being of two or more races. Persons of Hispanic origin (who may be of any race) represented 8% of the older population. Discuss briefly, how the aging networks might address this change in demographics at the local level.
