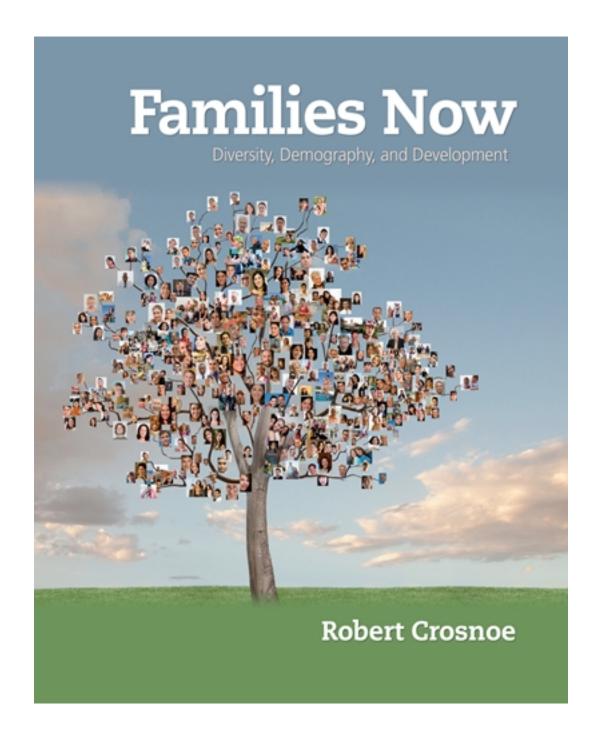

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Chapter 01: Essay

1. Family is defined in multiple ways because of the variability in norms and values. Groups of people with different backgrounds and traditions may disagree on what family really means. What factors make defining family difficult?

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- Cultural context matters.
- Groups have more or less power than others (inequality).
- Norms and values are subjective to the group to which an individual is a part.
- Culture shapes an individual's lived experiences (Bourdieu: public ≠ private).
- 2. What is a social structure? How does it relate to the study of families?

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- Social structure is the broad organizational and institutional apparatus of a society.
- Family is one social structure, and families also interact within other social structures (e.g., education, economy/work, religion, neighborhoods, government, gender, race, and socioeconomic status).
- 3. What is the connection between globalization and women's roles in the family? Why should sociologists consider issues of globalization when trying to better understand families?

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- Globalization has created more opportunities for women, thus changing norms for women in the U.S. labor market and in families.
- Because more women work, age at first marriage and age at first birth are delayed.
- Increased economic independence gives women greater freedom to choose not to marry or to end bad marriages.
- Globalization increased divorce rate and reshaped gender roles.
- 4. As researchers, it is important to acknowledge biases in our work. What are three types of bias that can affect sociological research on families? How can researchers acknowledge these biases in their work?

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- Perspective bias is having inaccurate views of the past (vs. now) and other contexts for comparison.
- Researchers must make comparisons with family in the past and in other cultures using objective, scientific data.
- Unity bias is emphasizing family solidarity at the expense of recognizing that some family members' interests may be in conflict.
- Researchers must consider that what is best for the family as a whole can be undermined by interests specific to one family member.
- Selection bias is a lack of inquiry into how a family situation arises.
- When studying the connection between topics A and B, researchers must consider whether other variables C (or D, E, F, etc.) lead to both A and B.
- 5. The scientific method is an essential framework for researchers of all fields. In addition to following the

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scientific method, what are three important components of good scientific research?

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- Theory guides research, which modifies or enriches theory or develops a new theory.
- Methods are strategies for observing what is going on in the world. The point is to collect and analyze evidence objectively.
- 6. Suppose Joaquin and Maria are interested in the influence of parents on adolescent delinquent behavior. Maria correctly uses the scientific method to design a survey to collect data and draw conclusions. Joaquin relies on his childhood memories and his personal experiences with current friends and family to draw conclusions. Did Joaquin develop a theory like Maria did? Why or why not?

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- No. A theory is a concise set of principles that describes or explains some social phenomenon.
- Unlike Maria, who collected data using a survey, Joaquin used his own memories and personal experiences. Therefore, Joaquin cannot extrapolate his own experiences as a sound theory.
- 7. Define quantitative research and qualitative research as they apply to the sociological study of families. List one quantitative research method and one qualitative research method that a sociologist would use to study divorce. What kind of data would these research methods be able to convey?

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- Quantitative research conveys statistical analyses of numerical data. For example, based on survey data, it can report numbers of divorce per year or proportion of marriages in a certain population that end in divorce.
- Qualitative research conveys analyses of written, recorded, or observed data that cannot be easily quantified. For example, it can be interviews of people discussing their feelings about their divorces or videos of divorcing couples as they communicate with each other during arguments.
- 8. What is meant by the macro level and the micro level? Provide an example, related to families, that demonstrates how the macro and micro are connected.

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- The micro level highlights the interactions and experiences of individual people and small groups in everyday life. It concerns what goes on among people in their everyday lives, especially the personal feelings, individual behaviors, and interpersonal interactions that occur within families, schools, and neighborhoods.
- The macro level highlights the large-scale organization of a society. It concerns identifying patterns that go beyond any one person and are difficult to recognize as members of an individualistic society.
- 9. Developing a theoretical perspective is an important part of the scientific process. Describe two sociological theories that are used to understand families.

ANSWER: Suggested Answer:

Student answers will vary. A complete answer may include:

- The family systems perspective focuses on the different parts of a family and how they interact

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with each other.

- The family is viewed as a cohesive unit that can be broken into complex interactions among subsystems, made up of individual members, each with his or her own brain and body.
- The life course paradigm focuses on the paths that people take through life within a particular context and historical era.
- The theory incorporates connections between individuals' lives, the society in which they live, and the relationship between individuals.
