Sample Answer: Behavior refers to physical actions, such as jumping or eating. Affect refers to emotions, such as anger or fear. Cognition refers to thinking, such as solving a math problem or using your memory.

Sample Answer: Application refers to using evidence-based research to influence life. For example, if we know that people sleep better and longer in cool environments, we may want to turn down the thermostat in the evening. Or, since we know that blue light exposure is not good for sleep, we might want to tell our child that they cannot watch TV or look at their phones in the final thirty minutes before they go to sleep, and they cannot keep their phone at their bedside.

Sample Answer: Nature refers to the influence of biology and genetics. Some tall parents may have tall children whose height may provide an advantage in certain sports, and athletic parents may have children who are very coordinated and who find that sports come easy to them. Nurture refers to the impact of the environment. So, parents may spend a lot of time

playing or watching sports with their children. Parents may also enroll their children in sports leagues or send their children to a camp that focuses on sports.

44. Describe the difference between critical periods and sensitive periods.

Sample Answer: Critical periods are the ages when certain experiences are necessary for a physical or psychological ability to develop. For example, the first few years of life are especially important for developing language skills. If we are not exposed to language then, it can be more difficult to learn later. Sensitive periods are the ages when the development of a characteristic is especially vulnerable to the impact of the environment. For example, adolescence is an important time for people to explore their identity. So, how we spend our time and who we spend our time with can have a big influence.

Sample Answer: The zone of proximal development means that we can achieve beyond our current level with help (perhaps from others). For example, a child may struggle to understand multiplication. However, if an older sibling assists the child, they may be able to start grasping this concept.

Sample Answer: Reinforcement encourages behavior, whereas punishment discourages it. For example, a caregiver would want to reinforce a child who has demonstrated good manners or earned good grades in school, but the caregiver might want to punish their child who was hitting someone or has stayed out past curfew.

Sample Answer: The independent variable is altered, and it is expected to influence some outcome behavior. The dependent variable is believed to be impacted by the independent variable. For example, a researcher could control how much caffeine people are given to see if that influences people's moods. The independent variable would be the caffeine, whereas mood would be the dependent variable.
