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PURPOSE AND PERSPECTIVE OF THE CHAPTER

Psychology is the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. The beginning of the chapter takes a look at the history of psychology and psychological study including a discussion of contributions made before psychology was formally considered an independent field of study (e.g., Aristotle and Socrates). Early subfields of psychology such as structuralism, functionalism, and psychoanalysis are discussed as well as an overview of the contemporary perspectives. This chapter introduces the discipline of psychology as a science by reviewing the scientific method, hypothesis testing, and various types of research methods. These include correlational studies, survey research, experimentation, and case studies. The final part of the chapter addresses the importance of critical thinking and standards of ethics when conducting research as well as when evaluating research findings.

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KEY TERMS

Applied research: Research conducted in an effort to find solutions to real-world problems.

Behaviorism: The school of psychology that defines psychology as the study of observable behavior and studies relationships between stimuli and responses.

Biological perspective: The approach to psychology that seeks to understand the nature of the links between biological processes and structures such as the functioning of the brain, the endocrine system, and heredity, on the one hand, and behavior and mental processes, on the other.

Blind: In experimental terminology, unaware of whether or not one has received a treatment.

Case study: A carefully drawn biography that may be obtained through interviews, questionnaires, psychological tests, and other methodologies.

Cognitive: Having to do with mental processes such as sensation and perception, memory, intelligence, language, thought, and problem solving.

Control groups: In experiments, groups whose members do not obtain the treatment, while other conditions are held constant.

Correlation: An association or relationship among variables, as we might find between height and weight or between study habits and school grades.

Correlation coefficient: A number between +1.00 and –1.00 that expresses the strength and direction (positive or negative) of the relationship between two variables.

Correlational method: A mathematical method of determining whether one variable increases or decreases as another variable increases or decreases.

Critical thinking: A way of evaluating the claims and comments of other people that involves skepticism and examination of evidence.

Debrief: To explain the purposes and methods of a completed procedure to a participant.

Dependent variables: A measure of an assumed effect of an independent variable.

Double-blind study: A study in which neither the participants nor the researchers know who has received the treatment.

Experiment: A scientific method that seeks to confirm cause-and-effect relationships by introducing independent variables and observing their effects on dependent variables.

Experimental groups: In experiments, groups whose members obtain the treatment (also termed *treatment groups*).

Functionalism: The school of psychology that emphasizes the uses or functions of the mind rather than the elements of experience.

Gender: The socially constructed roles, behaviors, activities, and attributes that a given society considers appropriate for different genders. Sex refers to the biological status of being male, female, or intersex, whereas gender implies the psychological, behavioral, social, and cultural aspects of gender (i.e., masculinity, femininity, nonbinary, nonconforming, or other gender).

Gender diverse: An umbrella term for people whose gender identity does not conform to traditional expectations based on their assigned sex; gender-diverse people may identify as transgender, nonbinary, or another term.

Gestalt psychology: The school of psychology that emphasizes the tendency to organize perceptions into wholes and to integrate separate stimuli into meaningful patterns.

Hypothesis: In psychology, a specific statement about behavior or mental processes that is tested through research.

Independent variable: A condition in a scientific study that is manipulated so that its effects may be observed.

Informed consent: A participant's agreement to participate in research after receiving information about the purposes of the study and the nature of the treatments.

Introspection: Deliberately looking into one's own cognitive processes to examine one's thoughts and emotions.

Naturalistic observation: A scientific method in which organisms are observed in their natural environments.

Placebos: A forged treatment that has the appearance of being genuine.

Population: A complete group of interest to researchers, from which a sample is drawn.

Psychoanalysis: The school of psychology that emphasizes the importance of unconscious motives and conflicts as determinants of human behavior.

Psychology: The science that studies behavior and mental processes.

Pure research: Exploratory research conducted without concern for immediate applications.

Random sample: A sample drawn so that each member of a population has an equal chance of being selected to participate.

Reinforcement: A stimulus that follows a response and increases the frequency of the response.

Sample: Part of a population.

Scientific method: An organized way of using experience and testing ideas to expand and refine knowledge.

Selection factor: A source of bias that may occur in research findings when participants are allowed to choose for themselves a certain treatment in a scientific study.

Social cognitive theory: The school of psychology in the behaviorist tradition that includes cognitive factors in the explanation and prediction of behavior, formerly termed *social learning theory*.

Sociocultural perspective: The view that focuses on the roles and race/ethnicity, gender, culture, and socioeconomic status in behavior and mental processes.

Stratified sample: A sample drawn so that identified subgroups in the population are represented proportionally in the sample.

Structuralism: The school of psychology that argues that the mind consists of three basic elements—sensations, feelings, and images—that combine to form experience.

Survey: A method of scientific investigation in which a large sample of people answer questions about their attitudes or behavior.

Theory: A set of hypothesized statements about the relationship among events.

Volunteer bias: A source of bias or error in research reflecting the prospect that people who offer to participate in research studies differ systematically from people who do not.

 - a. Before going over the definition of psychology, break students into groups and allow them to discuss the following questions: What is psychology? What would you like to learn about regarding psychology?
 - b. After giving the groups time to come up with their answers, have a member from each group report to the class. Write all of their ideas on the board and discuss each idea. This activity helps students preview the course content and discover what they will learn versus what they wish they could learn in a psychology class.
2. **Classroom Activity 2: Your Path**
 - a. One of the best ways to illustrate what psychologists do is to share the instructor’s personal experience in the field. Instructors could talk about how they decided to pursue psychology, their graduate school experience, and what their career has been like. This is also a great way for students to get to know their instructors better.
3. **Classroom Activity 3: A “Modern” Approach**
 - a. For this lecture topic, discuss popular radio and TV shows in which psychologists discuss problems with people who either call in or come on the show. Consider showing an episode or clips from an episode.
 - b. Some of the popular psychologists utilizing these formats are Dr. Phil McGraw who calls himself a “life strategist” and Dr. Laura Schlessinger who has a radio program.
 - c. After viewing, students can discuss their impressions of these “modern” psychologists and anything else they experienced during the clip.
4. **Classroom Activity 4: Hypotheses**

- a. As instructors begin their discussion of the scientific method, they should discuss the meaning of hypothesis. Why is it important in research? Ask students to pick a research question of interest (e.g., Do children in nonparental childcare have more developed social skills?).
 - b. Have them brainstorm various ideas for a hypothesis to their question. Tell them to make sure that their hypotheses are measurable. Follow up with further discussion about why the hypothesis is an integral part of the scientific method.
5. **Classroom Activity 5: The Correlational Method**
 - a. Discuss the correlational method. Ask students to give examples of studies that could be conducted using this method.
 - b. Often, the limitations of correlations can be pointed out by using examples of correlations that are obviously not causal; for instance, the correlation between ice cream consumption and crime. Does eating ice cream cause criminal behavior, or could there be another factor influencing both? Another that works is the correlation between felons apprehended at home and milk in the refrigerator. These obvious examples can help students understand the correlational method and some of its limitations.
6. **Classroom Activity 6: Know Your Fields**
 - a. Before class, get enough index cards for every member of the class. On each card, write one of the fields of psychology (e.g., clinical psychology). Instructors will need to repeat fields, perhaps many times, depending on the size of the class. Instructors should mix up the cards and hand them out to the students, making sure they keep their assigned field private. Tell students that they will have 15 minutes to identify as many of their peers' fields of psychology as possible. To identify the fields, they can move around and ask each peer yes-or-no questions about their field. Simultaneously, they need to answer questions that they have been assigned. This activity forces students to be knowledgeable enough about their own field to answer questions correctly and also be knowledgeable about other fields so that they can ask helpful questions.
7. **Classroom Activity 7: Credibility of Sources**
 - a. To conduct this demonstration, instructors will need to obtain a psychological journal, a copy of a tabloid magazine, and a copy of the local newspaper. Take these to class and display them for students to see.
 - b. Have them answer, and discuss the following questions:
 - i. What types of methods do the authors of the articles use to gather their information?

- ii. Which source is most credible? Which is least? Why did you choose the order you did?
- iii. Does each of the sources of information have some truth to it? If so, how can you tell?
- c. These questions can initiate a class discussion and demonstrate the need for the scientific method and for critical thinking in psychology.
