77. Describe the levels of analysis used in psychological science. Select a behavioral or mental phenomenon of interest to you and suggest how it might be influenced by factors at each of the levels you identify.

ANS: Psychology relies on critical-thinking skills to help evaluate evidence and provide credible conclusions. Rather than relying on theoretical speculations, experimentation and systematic observations are used. Human behavior is complex because it depends on a number of factors, including genetic makeup, past experience, current environment, and cultural expectations. Student answers may vary—examples include depression, poverty, violence, anxiety, child abuse. A person who commits violence may have a genetic defect or may have grown up in a household

with violence by a parent, could be living in a rough neighborhood where violence is the norm, and may be around friends who are practicing violent behavior.

ANS: Student answers may vary. Facts are objective statements that have been proven through empirical study. Values are opinions or judgements and can't be measured objectively. A factual statement could be: On the last test, 71 percent of the students received a passing grade. A value statement is: On the last test, the professor really tried to make students fail with hard questions. Factual: There were twenty-three shootings on college campuses in 2022. Value: Too many people own guns.

ANS: Much of human behavior is caused by factors that are outside our awareness. Behavior is produced by many factors which come from different areas making it difficult to identify what caused what first. For example, a person who only ever knew violence as a child will act out violently, resulting in those around him being fearful and feeling threatened, typically resulting in others acting violently toward him.

ANS: Within the structuralist approach, research was very rigorous. However, it revealed the limitations, as participants are often not able to report on their subjective experiences. Student answers may vary. For example, I may be afraid of dogs, stemming from a dog bite as a toddler that I have no memory of.

81. Describe a behavioral or mental phenomenon in which you are especially interested. Discuss how the phenomenon might be approached from at least two of the following perspectives: biological, evolutionary, social, cognitive, and cultural.

ANS: Student answers may vary. An example is cocaine. Social—At low doses, cocaine can improve performance on visual attention tasks such as detecting specific stimuli appearing on a computer screen. Cultural—Cocaine abuse is associated with a history of violence and sexual abuse in the family. Biological level—Cocaine exerts its effects by prolonging the presence of specific chemicals at the junctions between nerve cells. Social—Cocaine abuse is associated with high levels of the personality trait of neuroticism and with low levels of the trait of conscientiousness.

82. Dr. Lin is a developmental psychologist; Dr. Cooper is a social psychologist; and Dr. Breaux is a cognitive psychologist. For each of these psychologists, briefly define the subfield in which he or she specializes and suggest one issue or question in which he or she might be especially interested.

ANS: Dr. Lin conducts research on the changes that occur in life cognitively, emotionally, and socially and would work to understand the impact of pre-K on young children. Dr. Cooper studies group behaviors, workplace attitudes, and leadership and would work to understand the impact of work-from-home on the corporate environment. Dr. Breaux works in a research setting comparing brain imaging to a person's actions and would seek to understand the depths of the human memory. Student answers may vary.

83. Identify and describe at least two fields of psychology leading to potential careers in business settings.

ANS: Student answers may vary. A technology company may be interested in a hire with experience in applied experimental and engineering psychology which investigates how psychology can be used to make technology better. Psychologists who focus on industrial and organizational psychology can advise on how to improve work-life balance and leadership issues. Industrial-organizational and environmental psychology are useful in HR and safety business settings. Social and cross-cultural psychology fields work in marketing and organizational systems design.

84. Describe two ways that you can learn and remember information more effectively in your college courses. Provide concrete examples.

ANS: Student answers may vary. Students can use psychological research to develop more effective and more efficient ways to study, such as using elaboration, retrieval practice, and spaced practice. Learning is an active process and needs to be practiced. Elaboration allows us to study by connecting the information to things we already know, have experienced, or are learning. Spaced practices are effective as they allow us to study the material in several shorter sessions rather than one long one. Retrieval practice is effective as it uses practice tests to assess that we know and still need to learn.

85. We learned about various types of psychologists (i.e., researchers, practitioners, and educators). What is one thing common between different types of psychologists?

ANS: Some psychologists are researchers and others are practitioners, but all psychologists use scientific methods to inform their work. Research psychologists use scientific methods to create new knowledge about the causes of behavior, whereas psychologist-practitioners—such as clinical, counseling, industrial-organizational (I-O), and school psychologists—use existing research to enhance the everyday lives of others. The science of psychology is important for both researchers and practitioners.
